SOCIAL & YOUTH SERVICES:

- **AARP Tax Program** – AARP Tax-Aide is a free program providing income tax preparation assistance for low and middle income taxpayers of all ages, with special attention to those 60 and older. To schedule an appointment with a certified Tax-Aide counselor call Social & Youth Services at 860-721-2977. *To date 430 individuals have signed up for this program.*
- **Energy Assistance Program** - The Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) is now open around the state. The program is designed to help offset the winter heating costs of lower income households, especially those incomes that fall at or below 150% of the federal poverty guidelines; as well as households with elderly, disabled and/or children under the age of 6 with incomes between 150% and 200% of the federal poverty guidelines. *Guidelines: Family of 1 - \$32,514.56; Family of 2 - \$42,519.04 and Family of 3 \$52,523.52.* Wethersfield residents that fall within the guidelines may make an appointment with Social & Youth Services (860) 721-2977. All applications are completed by appointment only. *To date 358 households have applied for this program.*

PLANNING & ZONING:

- The Planning and Zoning Commission approved a 20 lot subdivision application submitted on behalf of Frank DiBacco, CCC Construction, LLC on Wednesday, January 20, 2016. The subdivision will be known as *Reservoir Estates*. Access to the development will be provided from Back Lane, two permanent and one temporary cul-de-sac are proposed. The road network is designed so that a connection can be made to an abutting subdivision located north of the property. The developer has also provided 3.6 acres of open space that abuts the Town owned 1860 Reservoir. Plans are available for review in the Planning Department.

- **CREC Discovery School:** TPZ working with CREC staff on rooftop HVAC screening.
- **Main/Marsh/Church Intersection:** Spring replanting of lawn as required.
- **CT DOT Traffic Signals:** Staff working with DOT on input for signal upgrades. Final plans in for Silas Deane Hwy @ Mill Street and Wells Road @ Willow Street.
- **Montinero Field Drainage:** Completed. Touch up of settled areas and grass within the next few weeks, weather permitting.
- **BOE Security Doors Elementary Schools:** Bids awarded for Emerson Williams and the front entry of Charles Wright.
- **Mulchsealing:** Public Works Committee evaluating continuation of this program.
- **Emerson Williams Front Sidewalk Repairs:** Wespro will continue in the spring.
- **Millwoods LL Parking Lot:** All stone and grading completed; paving around island in April.
- **LED Streetlights:** Staff reviewing three firms for light purchase and LED conversion.
- **Spring Paving:** Work being scheduled for last week of April.
- **Wayfinding signs:** Project ramping up for the replacement of signs at the town building and completion of welcome signs.
- **Dam inspections:** GZA dam engineers to review and scope inspection of 9 town owned dams per DEEP requirements.
- **Route 175/Russell Rd:** CT DOT exploring concept of curbed islands for safety channelization from southbound off ramp off Rt. 15.

We have established dental clinic dates for the 2015-2016 grant years at the Senior Centers in Berlin, Newington and Wethersfield, and we are partnering with the Lodge at Cold Spring in Rocky Hill.
 - We received an additional \$1,500 from NCAAA to put on extra clinics until September 2016. This funding does not need to be matched from CCHD. Supplementary clinics will be planned soon.
- Childhood Lead Case Management
 - Conducting case tracking and management of lead poisoned children via DPH Maven database. We have 7 lead cases currently open in the District.
- Emergency Preparedness
 - Working with Charlie and Judy to develop a new list of non-medical and medical volunteers for emergency preparedness. This will be useful to create an active volunteer force for the District to prepare for future emergency preparedness events. A preliminary meeting with Charlie and Judy was held to plan activities through June.
- National Public Health Week (NPHW)
 - Currently working with Bryan Nagel, a student from Southern, to work on messaging for NPHW. We are putting together press releases and articles to spread the word about the importance of that week and the activities that will be highlighted.
 - Worked with the towns to set up the CCHD Board members to receive proclamations on behalf of the District for the week.

In Connecticut Suburb, a Water War Breaks Out

Special rate for bottling company triggers concern over natural resources

A water war has broken out in Connecticut.

A bottled-water company's plan to use up to 1.8 million gallons of water daily in the town of Bloomfield is driving a debate about the state's natural resources and prompting legislation to address complaints about the way the project won approval.

Opponents say the public didn't have a chance to weigh in on the Hartford suburb's approval of Niagara Bottling's venture or a discounted water rate that benefits the California company—claims the company denies. Critics also say the project tells out-of-state businesses that Connecticut's water is up for grabs.

"It's undermining our statewide efforts to properly manage our water," said Lori

Brown, executive director of Connecticut League of Conservation Voters, an environmental group.

Defending the project are Niagara Bottling and the Metropolitan District, the nonprofit municipal corporation that provides water to about 400,000 residents and business in 12 towns, including Hartford, West Hartford and Bloomfield.


It “in no way would pose a threat or strain on the [district] water supply,” said Stan Bratskeir, a spokesman for Niagara Bottling. The plant would employ up to 120 people, he said. The company plans to filter, purify and add minerals to the water it buys.

The Metropolitan District, a water utility near Hartford, has been forced to answer questions about its special rate for industrial users and whether it is prioritizing residential customers.



The district sold 49.6 million gallons of water a day on average last year, said Scott Jellison, chief executive of the district. The district can safely sell 77.1 million gallons daily, he said.

The district sells water from the Barkhamsted Reservoir, in northern Connecticut near the Massachusetts border, and the Nepaug Reservoir, about 20 miles west of Hartford.

Mr. Jellison said the district raised water rates in recent years as

costs have increased and residents and businesses have used less water. If Niagara begins buying a lot of water, the district would be able to cut rates for all customers, he said.

“We are trying desperately to mitigate the increased water rate,” Mr. Jellison said. “The only way we can do that is to sell more water.”

The Niagara project nevertheless set off a movement in Bloomfield, where many residents have rallied against it.

Water shouldn't be "a commodity that a for-profit corporation uses to make profits," said Donna Landerman, a retired Bloomfield resident and member of the Bloomfield Citizens, a group formed to oppose the project. "It's our water."

After discussions with Niagara, the district approved discounted rates in December to customers who buy more than 500,000 gallons of water a day, Mr. Jellison said. That discount, along with one on sewer services, would save Niagara about \$2 million a year, Mr. Jellison said.

State lawmakers have introduced legislation that would direct the state Department of Public Health during emergencies to order that water sales to residential consumers take priority over commercial water-bottling companies that exported water out of state. The bill also would forbid utilities from selling water or providing sewer services to water-bottling companies at a discounted rate.

"This has started a conversation about who controls the water and what kind of safeguards are in place to make sure there is enough," said Democratic state Sen. Beth Bye, the legislation's main sponsor.

The bill would better protect residents during droughts and would remove a financial incentive for more water-bottling companies to come to the state, said Kevin Gough, a Bloomfield Citizens member.

Raul Pino, commissioner of the state's Department of Public Health, opposes the legislation and said it could have unintended consequences.

"It would force the commissioner of public health to prioritize one group over another and diminishes agency authority to implement a water conservation plan," Mr. Pino said. "Enforcement would be challenging...as we currently don't know how many public water systems have water bottling customers."

Ms. Bye said she would discuss modifying the bill with the Department of Public Health to address Mr. Pino's concerns.

Elizabeth Gara, executive director of the Connecticut Water Works Association, which represents public-water supply utilities, says water utilities comply with

strict oversight from the state to make sure there is an “adequate margin of safety” for the public’s water supply, she said. “A water company is not going to jeopardize that by serving an additional industry,” Ms. Gara said.

Many Bloomfield residents also are upset because they say that the town and the district hid Niagara’s plans. Mr. Gough, a member of the town’s Conservation, Energy and Environment Committee, said Niagara’s plan never came up for review in his committee. “No one knew,” he said.

Mayor Joan Gamble said it was public knowledge that Niagara had expressed interest in the site as far back as 2014. Town commissions and committees, including the Economic Development Commission, held meetings in the summer and fall of 2015 where they discussed Niagara, she said. “No attempt was made to hide the business that was coming to Bloomfield,” she said.

Opponents point out that Niagara’s applications for local permits and approvals didn’t list the company as the applicant and didn’t indicate that the facility would be a bottling plant. Mr. Bratskeir, the Niagara spokesman, said the company choose not to broadcast its intent for competitive reasons. He added that Niagara executives attended a zoning commission meeting and a wetlands commission meeting.

Rep. David Baram, a Democrat, sponsored legislation that would require land-use and tax abatement applicants to disclose all the parties involved and the specific purpose of the application. “To me, the public interest outweighs the private interests of competitiveness,” he said.

Water Aplenty For Niagara Bottling

MDC Commission Member Says Bloomfield Commercial Plan Fills Need, Offers Jobs

Critics of Niagara Bottling's plan to locate a manufacturing plant in Bloomfield say that allowing the company to use up to 1.8 million gallons of water a day could strain the region's water supply, which is provided by the Metropolitan District Commission. Their fears, however, are unfounded.

The MDC is a regional organization that sells water at cost and is run by an unpaid board of commissioners. The MDC controls more than 40 billion gallons of AA class water in its reservoirs. Currently these reservoirs are 95 percent full. These calculations are backed up by more than 100 years of data on precipitation and stream flow.

Thirty years ago, the MDC sold more than 66 million gallons of water a day to the commercial, industrial and residential users in our region. Today, sales have shrunk to just under 50 million gallons per day. Since 1986, MDC industrial sales have declined,

from 17 million gallons a day, to 2 million gallons per day. Less usage translates into a higher cost for everyone.

The MDC water rate is by far the lowest in the region. Recently, however, state and federal government requirements have added a \$2 billion clean water construction program to improve sewer sanitation on top of that cost. The result of this mandate is a doubling of the cost of water.

In a perfect world, no one would need bottled water. Everyone would have access to clean, safe and abundant drinking water. This world does not exist.

Imagine the Flint, Mich., crisis without bottled water for people whose municipal supply is tainted with lead. Niagara bottling company, which for unknown reasons is a pariah to some, has provided millions of bottles of water to the affected residents. Without such a resource the Flint consumers would have to drink contaminated water. Flint, sadly typifies the water problems of far too many areas.

Americans consume well over 11 billion gallons of bottled water yearly. The amount

of water consumed has risen dramatically over the past decade, to the detriment of sugary drinks. Bottled water is clearly cheaper than soft drinks, consumes significantly less water to produce a similar quantity and uses far less energy. Frankly, this is a positive trend.

Bottled water accounts for less than 0.01 percent of all the water used in the United States each year. The city of Los Angeles runs through more than 3 billion gallons of water a week. New York City uses about 7 billion gallons a week. The United States Geological Service estimates that more than 355 billion gallons of water is used in the United States every day.

It is hard to see how banning Niagara from establishing a plant in Connecticut is going to change anything, with the exception of denying some residents jobs, MDC customers much needed rate relief and the town of Bloomfield development. Hartford residents need jobs. The MDC board, Republicans, Democrats and independents, after providing public notice, voted unanimously to provide a volume

discount to entice greater industrial use. The more water the MDC sells to industrial customers, the lower the rates are for everyone. If Niagara had been a customer for 2016, the water rate could have been reduced by 10 cents for every 748 gallons used.

If Connecticut bans the sale of water to a bottling company, it will go elsewhere; market reality dictates a need for Niagara's product. Opponents hypothesize, without any factual basis, that we might run out of water if we sell to Niagara. Let's live in reality: MDC has more than 20 million additional gallons of water that is available to be sold every day. Niagara, at full capacity will use less than 2 million gallons per day.

We need to remember that a lot of our fellow citizens need a job, and need to have the cost of the water they use reduced. A blue-collar job paying \$14 dollars per hour is far better than no job at all.

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


