A Very, Very Special Thanks to Jennifer Glick!

Jennifer Glick was a very active and highly valued member of the Wethersfield Veterans Commission for the last three years contributing greatly to the newsletter and reading her poetry at veterans events. Jennifer grew up in Simsbury, CT. She graduated from college in 1969 with a nursing degree. After graduating, she headed west to Texas. While working in a hospital in Texas, she was recruited by the Army for a special nurses program in Vietnam. It was 1970, and Jennifer was a First Lieutenant. She went to Fort Sam Houston for six weeks of nurses' basic training. She arrived in South Vietnam in November 1970 and was assigned to the 67th Evacuation Hospital in Qui Nhon where she served for seven months until being transferred to the 6th CC in Cam Ranh Bay for the rest of her tour of duty. Jennifer's nursing experience focused primarily on the area of mental health.

Perhaps, the most important lesson that Jennifer learned from her service in Vietnam is that while the physical wounds heal, the psychological wounds linger. Post Traumatic Stress Disorder was not an official diagnosis until the 1980's but many service men and women were dealing with it after Vietnam. Jennifer herself dealt with PTSD with a recurring dream for 20 years after her Vietnam Service.

Upon returning home in November of 1971, Jennifer decided not to remain active in the Army. She continued her career in nursing at hospitals, in the managed care community, and finally ended up in the Commissioner's Office of the CT Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services. Her focus was on long term care for people with behavioral issues. She obtained her Master's Degree in Social Work which led to an adjunct teaching position at the UConn School of Social Work teaching Aging and Mental Health.

Jennifer is now retired, but volunteers as a resident advocate for the State's Long Term Care Ombudsman. In her free time, she likes to write poetry and create mixed-media art work. We are grateful for Jennifer's service to our country, and to our community through her service on the Veterans Commission.

Heroes and Hounds

Military Working Dogs have played an important part in wars and conflicts going back to WWI.

The Heroes and Hounds program was founded in 2009, supporting soldiers and working K9 partners. Since 2009, Mark Rudewicz has sent nearly 3,000 care packages and necessary equipment to the Middle East during the Iraq and Afghanistan conflicts. This program has also supported various units of every military branch here in the United States as well as bases in Europe.

All the packages are addressed on a very personal level to individuals and K9 Units. In the past Mark has brought the boxes to be shipped to Westover Air Force Base in Chicopee, MA.

Many American soldiers' lives have been saved because of the K9's keen sense of smell and their ability to detect explosive devices. Usually, the K9 and its handler are out in front clearing the way on the road to detect any explosive devices that were planted. With all the technology in the military and law enforcement nothing still can beat the dog's nose. In the military the dog outranks his handler by one rank, so if the handler is a corporal then the dog is a sergeant. Please keep an eye out for more information!

LOCAL AND STATE RESOURCES FOR VETERANS

Town of Wethersfield Elderly Services:

Daniel Rosario is the Town's Elderly Services Coordinator providing citizens, including military veterans, with supportive community-based services, including necessary referrals, and information on Town and outside agencies' programs. Mr. Rosario can be reached at 860-721-2880 or via email at

Elderly Outreach and Case Management: For seniors with financial need who require assessment, referral or coordination of services to remain in their homes.

Transportation (Dial-A-Ride): Available to those age 60 and older and those with disabilities under age 60, who need transportation within the greater Wethersfield area. Priority is given to medical appointments. Yearly registration fee of \$78 and ID cards are issued.

Health Insurance Options (C.H.O.I.C.E.S.): A program for Health Insurance assistance, for state and federal benefit and support programs which may assist Connecticut seniors.

Friendly Shopper and Friendly Visitor: For homebound seniors, Friendly Shoppers do grocery shopping and Friendly Visitors provide social contacts and a friendly face to visit on a regular basis.

Renter Rebate: Provides rent subsidies for seniors and disabled who qualify.

Tax Preparation Assistance: An AARP-run program from February to April each year that provides tax preparation assistance to low and moderate income residents who need help filling out federal and state income tax forms. Appointments for assistance are made through the Department of Social and Youth

CT Department of Veterans Affairs (DVA) The Office of Advocacy and Assistance is located within the CT DVA at 287 West Street, Rocky Hill CT. The Office provides assistance to Veterans, their eligible spouses, and eligible dependents in obtaining veteran's benefits under federal, state, and local laws.

CT Veterans Legal Center: For help in facing legal challenges around access to the VA and veterans benefits, housing issues that might involve homelessness or eviction, consumer debt disputes, sexual assault, and discrimination. Also, there is assistance for veterans with a less than honorable discharge to upgrade their papers as well as for obtaining needed mental health services.

HEALTH CARE RESOURCES

Veterans Crisis Line 24/7: If you are a veteran, or concerned about a veteran, the Veterans Crisis Line is a free, confidential resource available to anyone, even if you are not registered with the VA or enrolled in VA health care. **Call 1-800-273-8255 and press 1. 988 Suicidal Crisis Lifeline: Funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the 988 Suicidal Crisis Lifeline is managed locally and is available for rapid access to trained crisis contact staff who provide people with referrals to resources, mobile crisis services, or emergency services as needed/desired. **To reach the Lifeline, call or text 988 or chat at www.988Lifeline.org.**

Update on CT Veteran's Directed Care Program (VDC): A state-wide program that is consumer directed providing older veterans services in their home from the caregiver of their choice.

- 1) You must be registered for VA Health Benefits to access the VDC Program. To register, call the VA Eligibility Center at 203-932-5711, ext. 3131.
- 2) If already registered for VA Health Benefits, contact your VA Social Worker or VA Primary Care Physician to discuss a referral to the program.
