The Office of Town Manager

Another year is almost in the books, and what a year it has been. As a community, we have seen some great achievements, heartbreaking losses, people rallying to support each other and unfortunately, more than our fair share of division.

On the positive side, Wethersfield continues to be recognized as a destination location, celebrating our rich history and the many local businesses that make this Town a desired location to live work and play. Many long vacant and underutilized commercial sites are well on their way to new and exciting business uses; including the former auction house (207 Church St.), Masonic Temple (245 Main St.) and nursing home (341 Jordan Ln). These three locations have been a priority for our economic development initiatives and their pending redevelopments will be transformational for our community.

The Town also received several important grants to help transform our transportation corridors. Major planning grants for both the Silas Deane Highway and Berlin Turnpike will position the Town to take full advantage of larger transportation funding opportunities to create roadways that are more pedestrian and bike friendly.

The Town put out many new social media posts this year and launched our new Instagram page. We will continue to expand our social media presence to keep our citizens informed of the many exciting happenings going on here in Town.

Speaking of events, in a Town where we have so many wonderful events each year, it's hard to believe we could add more and expand the ones we already do, but that is exactly what we did. With our many community partners, including The Keane Foundation, The Detective Robert "Bobby" Garten Memorial Fund, The Wethersfield Chamber of Commerce, the Old Wethersfield Shopkeepers and others, we saw more visitors and local residents enjoying all that Wethersfield has to offer, throughout the year. I can't over emphasize the critical role that Town staff has in ensuring that all of these great events run smoothly and safely. I want to thank them for all that they do, each and every day!

As a community we also experienced an unthinkable tragedy this year when we lost Volunteer Firefighter Robert Sharkevich Sr., in a line-of-duty death while assisting our neighboring communities battling the brush fire on Lamentation Mountain. The loss to his family, his fellow firefighters and the community he called home will be felt for a very long time. We will continue to honor Sharkey for his dedication and sacrifice in the months and years to come.

Finally, I have spoken a few times in this newsletter about the troubling trend of disrespect, anger and the complete lack of decorum that has proliferated both nationally and (more concerning to me) locally over the past year or so. The spreading of misinformation, name calling, and just outright negativity and rudeness has become commonplace both on social media pages and during public comment at our Town Council meetings. Engineering Update

SS4A Silas Deane Hwy Corridor Study:

The Town interviewed two consultants this week who submitted proposals to complete this study, which will include identifying safety and aesthetic improvements along approximately 4 miles of the road between Parsonage St in Rocky Hill and the Hartford city line. Staff is currently coordinating with Rocky Hill to recommend award of a contract to start the study early next year. This project is primarily funded with a federal Safe Streets for All (SS4A) grant.

Spring St Park and Dam Improvements:

The Town has issued a request for proposals from consulting firms to design park improvements and dam repairs near the Spring St pond, which are due on January 17th. This project will be funded with state Urban Act Grant funds administered by DEEP and we expect that the design process will start early next year.

Bell Pond Dam Improvements:

Staff met with the Town consultant, GZA, last week to discuss the project design status. Recent field investigations and a preliminary stability analysis indicates that the existing dam structure requires significant fortification to ensure it's stable after completion of the project. This involves installation of a thick concrete wall on the upstream or downstream side of the dam, which will significantly increase the cost of the project. We expect to meet with DEEP and the State Historic Preservation Office early next year to discuss design and permit requirements, and additional funding programs to move the project forward.

DOT Silas Deane Hwy Traffic Signal Improvements (Project #118-0187):

Staff attended a preconstruction meeting this week with DOT staff and their contractor. This project involves replacing the traffic signals and equipment along approximately 4 miles of the road between Parsonage St in Rocky Hill and the Hartford city line to improve traffic flow. The project has been awarded to Ferguson Electric Co from Plainville, CT at a cost of \$8.1M. New poles, mast arms and cabinets will be painted black, and work is expected to start by summer of next year with completion in July 2026.

DOT Jordan Ln & Ridge Rd Traffic Signal Improvements (Project #171-0471):

Staff also attended a preconstruction meeting this week with DOT staff and their contractor. This project involves replacing traffic signals and equipment in various locations throughout

DOT District 1, which includes the Jordan Ln and Ridge Rd intersection. The project has been awarded to Ducci Electric Co from Farmington, CT at a cost of \$6.2M. New poles, mast arms and cabinets will be painted black, and work is expected to start by summer of next year with completion of the entire project by November 2026.

Old Common Drainage Improvements:

DiCioccio Bros. is currently completing drainage improvements within a Town easement located between Old Common and Old Post Rd to address historic flooding issues in the area during severe storm events. The project schedule is primarily dependent on weather conditions.

Great Meadow Rd Guide Rail Repair:

Starline Fence Co. is currently repairing approximately 500 feet of existing 3-cable guide rail located along Great Meadow Rd near the entrance to The Meadows.
