While you are on that Scholastic site, there is a very cute song to learn called Soil, Water, Air and Light. We would LOVE to see some videos of your kids signing and moving to this song! We know what great singers they are!

A fun craft activity that you probably have all of the supplies for at home is binoculars! See the below link for instructions. I would recommend

measuring paper to cover the tubes and having the kids cut strips to fit! They can add stickers or color them how they'd like.

One of the kids' favorite activities we did in the fall was a nature walk around the school building. On a nice day, take those binoculars outside for a nature walk. Try to find the best sign of spring: a robin! OR some daffodils, tulips, or other pretty flowers.

To practice number recognition, a fun activity could be to cut out a stem, leaves, and lots of petals for a flower. (Have the kids help with this!) Have the kids roll a die, and add that many petals to the flower. You can do this many times before deciding to glue it all together with the number of petals that looks best. CHALLENGE: Can they write the number of petals they chose?
